A CARD.

MR. SMITH desires to say to the people of Springfield that the pictures forming this collection were selected by him from the studios of the artists of New York, and are characteristic works, representing each artist in his specialty. There are no less than five pictures which were painted for, and exhibited in, the National Academy of Designs, at the Annual Exhibition, and six that were painted expressly for this collection.

He will also say that this is not a commercial speculation in any sense. Each picture (with a single exception) is the property of the artist whose name it bears, and is sold for his account.

Mr. Smith's object in interesting himself in this matter, is to bring the artists and the people of Western Massachusetts together through the medium of an Annual Exhibition, where the best works of the artists—and those only—may be purchased at the lowest studio prices.

Should a reasonable number of works be sold from the present Exhibition, the artists have promised to contribute next year. Should such a number not be sold, they (receiving no encouragement) will not again send.

This offers an opportunity for art culture, rare out of metropolitan circles. And it will be at once recognized that the patronage of this effort should be prompt and liberal, as its failure this season will for a long time close the gate to refined art in Springfield.
